

DISTRICTS ARE FIXED BY BOARD

County Commissioners Also Name Registrars To Serve For Coming Election.

Yesterday's meeting of the board of county commissioners was taken up with the delimitation of the election districts for the county and the appointment of registrars for elections, both primary and general, that are to be held this year.

A number of changes were made in the boundaries of districts. The two Wardner precincts were consolidated into one, as the combined vote of the two precincts has fallen under 300. The boundaries of Wallace No. 2 and No. 3 were also changed to make the lines conform to the lines of the city wards No. 2 and No. 3, which will make the two precincts about the same size, and do away with the confusion, always arising in the past at every city and county election, as many of the voters have heretofore resided in Ward No. 2 but in county precinct No. 3. Government precinct was also changed to smelter precinct, and a portion of the territory formerly embraced in Kellogg No. 2, included therein.

DIES WHILE ON VISIT IN EAST

William Morrison Cleeland, Pioneer Who Crossed Plains, Passes Away.

William Morrison Cleeland, father of Mrs. George N. Osborne of Wallace, died in East Liverpool, Ohio, April 17, after having left Wallace just a month ago to visit his sister and other relatives in Ohio and Pennsylvania.

He was born in Butler, Penn., January 13, 1838. At the age of 18 he crossed the plains with a government train and was in a number of skirmishes with the Indians, and spent several years in what was then the far west.

He served for three years in the Civil war, enlisting with the 155th Pennsylvania volunteers and was a sergeant in the First company of the Second battalion of the invalid corps.

Mr. Cleeland was married in 1861 at Elk River, Penn., to Eliza A. Evans. Seven children were born to them, four of whom are living. They are Morrison E. Cleeland, Cebu, Philippines; Mrs. A. W. L. Woodland, Seattle; Mrs. O. C. Seltzer, Great Falls, Mont.; and Mrs. George N. Osborn, Wallace.

There are ten grandsons and two great granddaughters. Mr. and Mrs. Cleeland had lived for 45 years in Minnesota and Montana and for the past 10 years had made their home at Black Lake, Idaho. Mrs. Cleeland died at Harrison in October, 1915. Mr. Cleeland was a member of the G. A. R. veterans at Coeur d'Alene, the B. P. O. E. at Wallace and the A. F. & A. M. at Great Falls, Mont.
